## 3. Community:

a. **Eon Youth Program, Thornhill-Lopez Center on 4<sup>th</sup>**: 526 N. 4<sup>th</sup> Avenue, Tucson; Open M-F 3pm to 7pm, and some Saturdays. The Thornhill

- Lopez Center provides a free safe space for LGBTQ+ youth and allies, complete with a lounge, computers, performance stage, patio, laundry facilities, full kitchen, and bathrooms with showers. Free services include skills-building, advocacy, and culturally competent care to LGBTQ youth and their allies ages 13-26.
- b. 101Space, Joel Valdez Main Library, 101 N Stone Ave; Workshop center hours M-Th 3pm-6pm, Fri 3pm-5pm. 101Space is a youth center and makerspace and is part of the Pima County Public Library. They offer workshop hours and programs after school each weekday with comfortable seating for teens to hang out, computers, 3D Printers, button makers, podcasting and sound recording, after school snacks and more. Staffed by LGBTQ+-affirming librarians and paid teen mentors, 101Space is a safe and inclusive spot for youth ages 12-18.
